A snapshot of Australia's children

Approximately 4.3 million children live in Australia, making up almost 20% of the total Australian population. 5% are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, 8% were born overseas and 1% arrived as refugees. One third live in New South Wales, while about one quarter (24%) and one fifth (21%) live in Victoria and Queensland, respectively.



Every day in Australia there are more than 167 substantiated reports of child abuse or neglect.



Key issues facing Australia's children

Abuse: Substantiated reports of child abuse or neglect increased by over 45% from 2010 to 2016. (AIHW 15/16)

Violence: 61% of women experienced violence from an expartner while children were present. (ABS 12)

Poor education: Almost a quarter of Australian children are developmentally vulnerable in one or more areas of early child development. (AIHW 11/12)

Poverty: More than 730,000 Australian children live in poverty (one child in six).

Neglect: In 2016, 26% of children who were the subject of a substantiated report suffered from neglect. (AIHW 2015/16)

Homelessness: Children under 18 years of age make up 27% of people experiencing homelessness. (ABS 2012)

Mental illness: In 2012-13 almost 14% of children aged 4-17 experienced mental health disorders. (AIHW 12)

Disability: In 2009, 290,000 children aged 0-14 years had a disability. (ABS 2012)
