

A snapshot of Australia's children & families

There are over 6.1 million families in Australia, including people related by blood, marriage (registered or de facto), adoption, step or fostering. Approximately 5.2 million children and young people (0-18 years) live in Australia, making up almost 22% of the total Australian population. 5% are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander. Couples with dependent children make up 45 per cent of all Australian families. Single parent families with dependent children make up 16 percent of all Australian families.



Every day in Australia there are more than 167 substantiated reports of child abuse or neglect.

Children under one year old are most likely to be the subject of substantiated abuse and neglect.

Key issues facing Australia's children & families

Abuse: Substantiated reports of child abuse or neglect increased by over 45% from 2010 to 2016. (AIHW 15/16)

Violence: 61% of women experienced violence from an ex-partner while children were present. (ABS 2012)

Poverty: Approximately 14% of all Australians, including 17% of all children (730,000) live in poverty. That equates to one child in six. (Homelessness Australia 2016)

Homelessness: Children under 18 years of age make up 27% of people experiencing homelessness. (ABS 2012)

Mental illness: One in seven young Australians experience a mental health condition (14% of children aged 4-17).

Single parent hardship: Children in lone parent households are more than 3 times as likely to be living in poverty. (Poverty in Australia ACOSS 2016)

Disability: Almost 7% of children aged 0-14 years with a severe disability live in low-income households. (ABS 2010)

How Barnardos Australia helps children & families

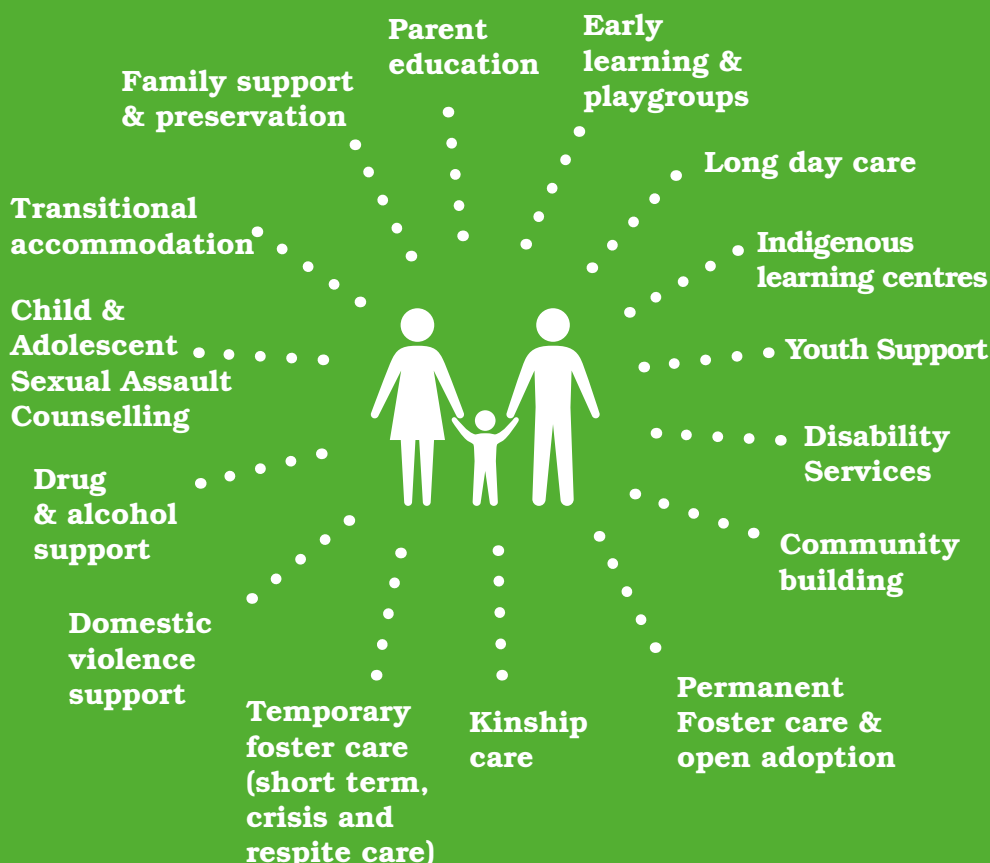
Barnardos Australia believes every child deserves a safe and stable home free from violence and neglect.

Barnardos Australia provides an extensive range of services to help families and their children including:

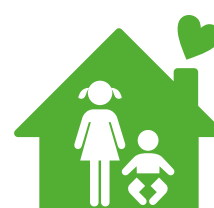
